

# Is there a large demand for energy storage batteries in Europe

What is the European market outlook for battery storage?

SolarPower Europe has published its new "European Market Outlook for Battery Storage", covering 2024-2028. The study delves into the specifics of the residential, C&I and utility-scale battery segments across the leading European markets.

How many battery energy storage systems were installed in Europe in 2024?

21.9 GWh of battery energy storage systems (BESS) was installed in Europe in 2024, marking the eleventh consecutive year of record breaking installations, and bringing Europe's total battery fleet to 61.1 GWh. However, the annual growth rate slowed down to 15% in 2024, after three consecutive years of doubling newly added capacity.

Recommendations How can European policymakers help the battery storage sector Battery storage systems are essential for strengthening the EU's energy security and competitiveness by enhancing flexibility, providing ancillary services to secure the grid, maximising the use of renewable energy, and effectively dealing with energy price volatility.

Which countries have the most battery storage in Europe in 2024?

In 2024, Europe's top three battery storage markets - Germany, Italy, UK - solidified their dominance, with Austria and Sweden closing the 'top 5' ranking (see Fig. 2). 2024 marked the first year when reaching the GWh scale of annual installations was required to access the top 5.

Can battery energy storage solve Europe's energy challenges?

In order to deploy renewables and to release their potential for ensuring a stable and secure energy supply, Europe needs to work to overcome the intrinsic limits of renewables. One solution to these challenges is Battery Energy Storage.

How much battery storage will Europe have in 2025?

In the most-likely scenario for 2025, 29.7 GWh of battery storage will be installed in Europe, representing a 36% annual growth. By 2029, the report anticipates a sixfold increase to nearly 120 GWh, driving total capacity to 400 GWh (EU-27: 334 GWh).



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
